




Remembering Bharat Ratna Sardar Patel on his 145th Birthday

The Federation of Indian Associations of New York, New Jersey and Connecticut (FIA-Tristate) joins the global Indian community in fondly remembering freedom fighter and administrator, Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel on his 145th birth anniversary. Patel was India's first deputy prime minister.

Born on Oct. 31, 1875, in Nadiad Gujarat as one of six in the family of Jawarbhai Patel, Sardar Patel's incredible brilliance, statesmanship and diplomacy, made him one of the greatest freedom fighters, leader and administrator par excellence. It was Sardar Patel who was the chief architect of modern India and was instrumental in the successful integration of the 565 self-governing princes states into the Indian federation, thus foiling the plan of the British.





Sardar Patel, a barrister by profession, was practicing law until he came in contact with Mahatma Gandhi in late 1916. He led many agitations and movements against the British regime. He was the president of the All India Congress. His contribution to India's freedom struggle is well-known.

He was married to Jhaverba Patel and the couple had two children - daughter Maniben and son Dhayabhai. Jhaverba passed away in 1909, but he never remarried.

Sardar Patel had tremendous support within the Congress Party to become the prime minister of India, but at the request of Gandhiji, he let go the position, and accepted the post of deputy prime ministership. He held that post until he died on Dec. 15, 1950 in Bombay.

To honor Sardar Patel, Prime Minister Narendra Modi built a 600 feet tall statue which was inaugurated on Oct. 31, 2018. It stands tall atop Sadhu Bet island on the Narmada river, facing the Sardar Sarovar Dam downstream in Kevadiya colony, about 60 miles southeast of Vadodara.

A statue of Sardar Patel has also been installed on the premises of New Jersey's Royal Albert's Palace in Fords, by FIA's very own Albert Jassani. A well-known community leader and past president of FIA, Jassani is currently a member of the Board of Trustees.

Texas Teen Anika Chebrolu is America's Top Young Scientist for Discovering a Potential Therapy for COVID-19

Anika Chebrolu, a 14-year-old student from Frisco, Texas, has won the 2020 3M Young Scientist Challenge, an annual innovation competition hosted in partnership with Discovery Education.

She used in-silico methodology for drug discovery to find a molecule that can selectively bind to the spike protein of the SARS-CoV-2 virus to find a cure for COVID-19. The teen's coveted prize includes the 'America's Top Young Scientist' title, a \$25,000 cash prize, and a one-of-a-kind destination trip. The freshman at Independence High School freshman competed against nine other finalists.

Laasya Acharya, a seventh-grader at Mason Middle School in Mason City School District from Mason, Ohio, won third place for utilizing a neural network to detect crop diseases through image analysis.

Chebrolu told CNN that her original goal was to identify a lead compound that could bind to a protein of the influenza virus to develop a novel

anti-influenza drug. But she switched gears when the COVID-19 pandemic quickly spread across the globe. "Because of the immense severity of the COVID-19 pandemic and the drastic impact it had made on the world in such a short time, I, with the help of my mentor, changed directions to target the SARS-CoV-2 virus," said the the young scientist aspiring to be medical researcher and professor.

One of the reasons Chebrolu entered the competition was her interest in science from childhood. "I have always been amazed by science experiments since my childhood and I was drawn towards finding effective cures for Influenza disease after a severe bout of the infection last year," she told CNN. "I would like to learn more from 3M scientists to pursue my drug development and with their help, would like to conduct in-vitro and in-vivo testing of my lead drug candidate."

In her study, Chebrolu discovered a molecule that can selectively bind to the spike protein of the SARS-CoV-2. Binding and inhibiting this viral protein would potentially stop the virus' entry into the cell, creating a viable drug target. In her research, She screened millions of small molecules for drug-likeness properties, ADMET properties and binding affinities against the spike protein using numerous software tools. The one molecule with the best pharmacological and biological activity towards the spike protein of the SARS-CoV-2 virus was chosen as the lead molecule that can be a potential drug for the effective treatment of COVID-19.


Chebrolu began work on her project last school year when she was an eighth grader at Nelson Middle School.

"I am extremely humbled at being selected America's Top Young Scientist as all of the finalists had amazing projects and were extremely well-rounded individuals," Chebrolu said in a press release issued by her high school. "Science is the basis of life and the entire universe and we have a long way to go understand it fully."

The SARS-CoV-2 virus is the cause of hundreds of thousands of deaths worldwide and was declared a worldwide pandemic and public health emergency earlier this year. With the virus continuing to spread far and wide, there is an urgent need to find an effective anti-coronavirus drug.

FIA Urges the Community to Vote in Large Numbers for the Nov. 3 Elections

The United States, in spite of the still grave impact of the devastating pandemic, is gearing up for the historic general election, for electing the president, vice president and several U.S. senators (6-year term), members of the House of Representatives (2-year term), as well as state and local representatives, on Nov. 3. Elections are currently underway. More than 40 million Americans have already cast their general election ballots, according to a survey of election officials by CNN, Edison Research, and Catalist. Pre-election data reveals that voters in the 47 states and Washington, D.C., are already setting records as they seek to cast their ballots either by mail or in-person where available less than two weeks before Election Day. Ballots cast so far represents almost 30 person of the more than 136 million total ballots cast in the 2016 presidential election.



In any democracy, voting is the most-powerful, prominent tool for the citizens to elect person(s), politically or otherwise, to favor issues of their choice to control and guide future systematic proceedings.

The election of the president and the vice president of the U.S. is an indirect election, in which citizens who are registered to vote in one of the 50 states or in Washington, D.C., cast their ballots, not directly for those two offices, but instead for members of the electoral college. These electors then cast direct votes, known as electoral votes, for the president and the vice president. The candidate who receives an absolute majority of electoral votes (at least 270 out of the 538), is then elected to the office.

The electoral college and its procedure are established in the U.S. Constitution by Article 11, Section 1, clauses 2 and 4. This is irrespective of popular votes received by the presidential candidate.

The Federation of Indian Associations of New York, New Jersey and Connecticut (FIA-Tristate), takes this opportunity to appeal to all eligible voters to cast their valuable votes to the party and candidates of their choice and to express their opinion publicly.

This year, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the voting system is somewhat complex, as some states are preferring casting the votes by mail-in ballots, though the option of casting the vote by visiting a designated polling booth is also available. As a result of this, it's being speculated that the counting of votes will take a substantial time, delaying the results.

However, we urge each and every voter to exercise their voting rights and ensure that ultimately, democracy wins.

After 1965, when President John. F. Kennedy broadened the Immigrant Visa Policy, there has been a rapid growth in the Indian American community. Currently, there are over 4.5 million Indian Americans in the U.S. An estimated 1.8 million among them are eligible to vote in this election.

This is indeed a significant number which could make an impact on the outcome of the result. However, many among our community are reluctant to register and to vote. This in turn deprives us of our rightful place and recognition as a community, which is known to be well-off and highly educated and resourceful, with representation in all fields and sectors, including politics.

We are also proud of Bobby Jindal, who served two terms as the governor of Louisiana, as well as of Nikki Haley, who served as the governor of South Carolina, and as the U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations.

Similarly, there are many Indian Americans who are elected or are running for elections at various state and local levels. It is gratifying to note here that for the past 25 years, several Indian Americans have served in various positions at federal, state and local administrations, irrespective of party affiliations.

Recreational Marijuana Concern - NJ Families & **Children - Question 1 NJ Ballot 2020**

Dear Executive Committee Members:

The Indian American community should be aware of a specific dangerous public health and safety issue that is facing all NJ families and children right now - the issue of "legalization of personal use cannabis" that is Question 1 on the NJ Nov 2020 Ballot. I am contacting you to ask for your help in educating your NJ members on the very serious aspects associated with this Referendum. Every NJ resident will suffer even as innocent bystanders, due to increased impaired drivers on our very congested NJ roads, increased auto and health insurance rates, more adults - and children - using these extremely potent and addictive THC products, taxpayer burdens and increased crime just to name a few of the extremely serious consequences that will affect all NJ families if concerned residents do not Vote No.

Unfortunately most people do not realize that Ballot Question 1 "legalization of personal use cannabis" is really about privately owned commercial potshops selling recreational weed products including edibles such as THC sodas and THC candies, along with vapes and smokes. They do not realize the potentially devastating effects "legalizing" today's high-potency THC pot products would have for all NJ families and children if we allow this to be voted through. It is important to note the ballot does not address decriminalization and it is not the medical pot.

No doubt you recognize that putting anymore drugs into NJ communities certainly is not the answer to social justice problems, but I also want to provide you with some specifics about the type of today's pot on the NJ ballot that you may not know: It is up to 99% pure THC (the psychoactive intoxicating addictive chemical in marijuana) compared to the marijuana of the 1970's which was only 5% THC and was bad enough then. Today's pot also is being marketed as the THC edibles mentioned above that look just like regular candies, sodas and baked goods. Many children in "legal" states are ending up in hospital emergency rooms.

The detrimental health issues are many including stroke, worsening of lung/respiratory conditions (particularly bad with NJ facing COVID and EVALI) as well exacerbating psychotic episodes, suicidality, and bipolar disorders. Even



URGENT - 8 DAYS LEFT TO TURN IN NJ BALLOTS for those of us who would never partake of these recreational marijuana products, we are at risk more impaired drivers on NJ roads, increased crime (crime increases in neighborhoods with potshops) which causes increased property insurance rates but decreased property values, increased NJ auto and health insurance rates.

> The ballot question does not address decriminalization and it is not the medical marijuana already in NJ potshops. It is simply recreational addictive impairment-causing "personal use" weed products advocated by an industry that preys on addictions, in particular in communities of low-income and color; its only concern is to make a commercial profit as with tobacco and alcohol (in fact several large tobacco companies have now invested in the pot industry).

> Speaking of profit, the promises of revenue do not materialize in the few States that have legalized; in fact it costs taxpayers \$4.50 in police and public health issues for every \$1 generated.

> In States that have "legalized", children ages 12-17 years old have increased their use of these high-potency pot products, even though the law says "age 21 years." Kids walking by potshops become desensitized to it, it becomes normal. Every town in NJ is susceptible - even in my small town of Highland Park for example a pot dispensary already has a conditional lease that if approved, will sell THC products right next to a pizza place.

> I have included some materials on this critically important subject that I hope you find helpful (see attachments); I would also urge you to visit nopotnj.org and njalm.org which are two not-for-profit bi-partisan committees created in New Jersey to educate on these issues and suggest residents Vote No in order to help preserve the health, safety and productivity of all NJ families.

> It would be wonderful if you would think about ways you can help spread the word on this to as many New Jersey families as possible, letting them know about this serious situation and the importance of Vote No on Question 1.

"Funny Boy" will debut on Netflix in the U.S., U.K., New Zealand and Australia on Dec. 10. It will also receive a theatrical release in Canada, as well as select cities throughout the U.S. that month.

Shah Rukh Khan and John Abraham to Share Screen Space in 'Pathan'

Bollywood actor John Abraham will be seen as an antagonist in Siddharth Anand's "Pathan," starring Shah Rukh Khan and Deepika Padukone. Like Anand's previous outing, "War," "Pathan" will be a slick and stylish revenge drama. It marks Khan's and Abraham's first on-screen union. The film also marks the end of Khan's two-year sabbatical. He was last seen in the 2018 film "Zero." Abraham meanwhile began shooting for the upcoming action-thriller film 'Satyameva Jayate 2' in Lucknow. Also starring Divya Khosla, "Satyameva Jayate 2," is produced by Bhushan Kumar, Krishan Kumar (T-Series), Monisha Advani, Madhu Bhojwani and Nikkhil Advani (Emmay Entertainment).
